





Chairman's Message



Since its founding year, Morning Star has been heavily involved in helping children develop their social emotional skills that are crucial for their personal and social well-being. In 2022, Morning Star opened a new NOVA Lab at Valour Primary School. This is Morning Star's 4th NOVA Lab, in addition to our existing NOVA Labs at St Joseph's Institution Junior, Montfort Junior School and St Stephen's School. In addition, Morning Star also piloted a Social-Emotional Learning Enrichment workshops using LEGO bricks at Montfort Junior School and Good Shepherd Place children's home. The LEGO bricks were sponsored by LEGO and were used for expressive play. It is hoped that the use of the LEGO bricks will make social and emotional learning more accessible and effective for the children.

In 2022, Morning Star continued to support families with children who are inadequately supported at home through upstream, preventive and early intervention programmes at our CareNights centres. This year, there was a significant increase in the number of volunteers stepping forward to give of their time and effort to the programme. This was most heartening. It shows that many in Singapore identify with and are prepared to share in our mission. It also gives us the confidence that we can extend CareNights to other neighbourhoods when called to do so.

Finally, a word about our training programmes.

Morning Star is a proud partner of the Parent
Support Programme (PSP) offered by the Ministry
of Social and Family Development (MSF). The
number of families impacted through our work in
the PSP has grown to almost 4,000 families in 2022
alone. Our parenting training programmes on

special focus areas like anger management, stress management and digital wellbeing have been especially attractive, a reflection of the stress points parents face in their work and social environments. There was also strong participation and interest among grandparents for our parenting programmes. In our Kopi Sessions for Grandparents, we shared skills for grandparents to better approach, interact and relate with their grandchildren.

As I have shared in my message last year, none of these programmes would have been possible without the help and support of our many partners and volunteers. I would like to take this opportunity to especially thank Mr Michael Koh who will be retiring from the Board in 2023. Michael joined the management committee of Morning Star in 2005. A firm believer in doing good to receive good, Michael was himself an alumnus of Morning Star's Common Sense Parenting training programme before joining and volunteering on the board. His calm presence and gentle hand in the board's deliberations have been both inspiring and inspirational. We wish him all the best in his future endeavours.

Equally critical to our work in 2022 as in previous years is the generous support of donors, government agencies and stakeholders. It cannot be gainsaid that our programmes are made possible only because of the unstinting generosity of our supporters and stakeholders. We offer these efforts and the wellbeing of all clients, sponsors and partners to God, who has sustained and continues to sustain our efforts. To him be all glory, honour and praise.

Conflict of Interest Policy





Nurturing One's Valuable Attributes is the acronym for NOVA Learning Intervention Programme which provided Social-Emotional Learning (SEL) support to Primary 1 to 5 children in four schools in 2022:

- Montfort Junior School
- St. Joseph's Institution Junior
- ► St. Stephen's School
- ▶ Valour Primary School

The NOVA programme is a complimentary programme for school children, with the vision that as many children as possible would benefit from building their SEL competencies to meet life's challenges during their growing up years.

NOVA Intervention Learning Programme is a child-centric, early intervention programme that adopts the CASEL (Collaborative for Academic, Social and Emotional Learning) framework which focuses on 5 core competencies:

Self-Awareness

- ▶ Relationship Skills
- Self-Management
- ▶ Responsible Decision-Making
- Social Awareness

The approach is a systemic and collaborative effort between the NOVA Team of Facilitators, the school leaders, form teachers and parents/ caregivers with the belief that a concerted effort will bring about a

sustainable positive behavioural change in the children.

NOVA is run daily within the school premises with the school providing needed facilities and the NOVA Team providing trained NOVA Facilitators and materials to engage the children.

Parents of children enrolled in NOVA are provided with Triple P® Parenting Workshops conducted by Trainers from our Family Wellness Division as a value-added service.

Fourth NOVA Lab @ Valour Primary School

A new NOVA Lab commenced at Valour Primary School (VPS) on 4 July 2022 as soon as the Covid-19 situation eased up in Singapore. The school leaders identified with NOVA's purpose and programme deliverables and collaborated with the NOVA Team to bring an established SEL programme to their school.



New Pilot-Tested Social-Emotional Learning Enrichment Workshop





A pilot test of an SEL Enrichment Workshop was done in November and December 2022.

2-day SEL workshops were conducted at Montfort Junior School and Good Shepherd Place children's home. Altogether, the workshop reached out to more than 60 children and equipped them with basic SEL knowledge and skills like Time Management, Problem Solving Skills, Emotional Regulation and Making Friends.

LEGO Singapore kindly sponsored the LEGO® bricks which were used as a form of expressive play during the SEL workshops.



When Edward* first joined NOVA, he struggled with managing disagreements with his peers and would retaliate verbally with unkind words. He also lacked positive team player skills and would frequently impose his opinions on others

Using NOVA programme lessons and targetted interventions through an Individualised Learning Plan (ILP) specially tailored for Edward, the NOVA Facilitators processed with Edward on the importance of managing disagreements effectively and coached him on what he could say to communicate his dislikes to his peers in a polite manner. In addition, the Facilitators encouraged Edward to practise perspective-taking through

roleplays to consider how his groupmates might feel when he was unwilling to listen to their suggestions. After 1 year and 9 months of attending NOVA, Edward displayed stronger social awareness and relationship skills competencies which helped him make positive decisions, such as being a better team player who was receptive to others' ideas during group activities, and he became a better listener.

After sustainable improvement in Edward's Social-Emotional behaviour had been observed across his three environments of home, school and NOVA, he graduated from NOVA in June 2022.

Token of Appreciation Built by NOVA Children from St. Joseph's Institution Junior (SJIJ)

Six boys from SJIJ were tasked to conceptualise and build a LEGO creation as a token of appreciation for LEGO Singapore's cash donation to the NOVA Programme. They built a NOVA Boat inspired by the idea that they could sail together with the NOVA Facilitators as they enjoy the NOVA programme where they have a fun environment to play and at the same time learn SEL skills.











Programmes

FWD Telegram Channel

The Family Wellness Division (FWD) leverages social media to reach out to busy parents who are often on the go. The Telegram channel is an additional resource to support and empower parents to raise happier and more confident children using curated information from well-loved parenting books to bite-sized caregiving infographics.

Creating an Ecosystem of Support for MSCS through Partner Engagement

The Programmes Team has initiated many conversations with stakeholders, both public and private alike. The intention is to share our work and open the possibility of collaboration and cross-fertilisation of ideas which help strengthen the brand equity of MSCS.

Through meeting like-minded partners, we gain valuable insights, discover opportunities for collaboration and forge a caring and collaborative ecosystem that the new Family Wellness Centre in Whampoa, as well as MSCS as a whole, is a part of.





They provided MSCS with 10 volunteers to pack goodie bags which are meant to be distributed to some 700+ residents at rented flats, as well as some other 20+ volunteers to engage residents at our Block outreach (2023).

SG Cares is also working closely with other department such as Student Care Services, to provide more volunteers to lead, sponsor and support programme delivery to our children.



Volunteer Engagement

MSCS is currently growing our pool of volunteers. We have the intention to provide volunteering opportunities beyond merely episodic ones to mid and longer-term commitment that are skills and interest-based, such that they can be mobilised for our projects.







Case Management

67 cases were referred for Case Management support in 2022. As of December 2022, 80 cases remained under active Case Management.

Case Management services continue to provide one-stop intake assessment services for both Morning Star Community Services and community enquiries seeking various support. This will ensure families and clients are accurately directed to relevant services that they require in a prompt manner.

We continue to enhance our collaboration with community partners and agencies for Case Management to render more holistic support to families in need.



Training

In 2022, Morning Star strove to collaborate with community partners in order to create more helping hands to deliver our programmes, thus, touching more lives and families.

Parent Training Programmes

Signposts for Building Better Behaviour @ MENDAKI

MENDAKI has been our partner since 2019, impacting 20 families thus far. This was no small feat as Signposts runs could only be conducted in-person. When safe management measures were lifted, we were able to quickly reconnect with MENDAKI and its clients to resume our Signposts runs. The clients were glad to meet up face-to-face for relationship building.



Triple P® (Positive Parenting Programme)

Our Triple P programmes continued to be well received by parents and caregivers. When we started promoting Level 4 Group Sessions with special focus topics, we attracted more 'eyeballs' to our programme which translated to more parents and caregivers attending the programme with us. This was because the focus topics like Anger Management, Stress Management and Digital Wellbeing, just to name a few, resonated with them. We impacted 756 families for Level 2 Webinars. There was a total of 226 clients for Level 3 One-to-one Coaching, clocking 1,808 hours. We also supported 64 clients for our Level 4 Group Sessions, who spent a total of 704 training hours with us.



Triple P Level 2 Webinars on Grandparenting & Kopi Sessions for Grandparents

We conducted 2 runs of Level 2 Webinars on Grandparenting in 2022. It was so heart-warming to see grandparents trying their best to tune in to us online that we proceeded to set up a face-to-face support group for grandparents, aptly named Kopi Sessions for Grandparents. Skills on how to pass on family values were coached to grandparents through playing traditional games like Five Stones, Snakes & Ladders and Pick Up Sticks. Passing their legacies down to their grandchildren could also be done creatively by sharing photographs of themselves depicting the different milestones in their lives. We were even featured on Channel NewsAsia, Channel 5 News (English) and Channel 8 News (Mandarin).



Brown Bag Lunch Talk & Podcast

To be in tune with the digitally savvy young parents of today, we started our Brown Bag Lunch Talk. We started in September with the title of Motivating Children to Learn. In October, we explored Understanding Love to Build Stronger Family Relationships, and in November, we had the topic of Dealing with Power Struggles. These lunchtime talks could also be accessed on our podcast in 2023.

Celebrate Our Children: A Family who Plays Together, Stays Together

On 7 October, in conjunction with Children's Day, we celebrated the occasion with families whose children were graduates of our IY Small Group Dinosaur programme. Through playing traditional games like Five Stones, Paper Heart Origami and Paper Bola, the children and their families learnt about their Love Languages. Parents also used the opportunity to inculcate their family values like respect, responsibility and honesty to their children.



The Incredible Years® Small Group Dinosaur Programme

Watching a child grow up physically is a joy. Witnessing a child grow socially and emotionally is a blessing. We journeyed with 6 children and their families from June to November. Each small change was affirmed, and each improvement was celebrated. Every opportunity was a hope that more good things would be coming. It was an honour to navigate with these children and their families in their journey of life.





ROAR with Dina



The popular March holiday workshop, ROAR with Dina, came roaring back in March 2022!
The children were coached in social-emotional regulation skills through the various fun play activities.



Couples Training Programme

Prevention & Relationship Enhancement Programme (PREP 8.0)



We conducted our first run of PREP 8.0, a couples programme to enhance couples' relationships, in October. As with all young couples starting a fresh journey of marital life together, our couples realised that this new phase was not a bed of roses. Candidly, they raised their challenges of making joint decisions, resolving issues amicably and respectfully and learning each other's quirks and idiosyncrasies first-hand. With role plays, the couples practised how they could solve problems together, understanding each other by applying the Listener-Speaker Technique. The couples left the 12-hour programme with a set of useful skills to protect and enhance their marital relationships.

Training Programmes for Professionals

The Incredible Years® Group Leaders Training (Online)

We were very fortunate to be able to have The Incredible Years® programme developer Dr Carolyn Webster-Stratton explain how to use the suite of The Incredible Years programme to promote social, emotional and academic competence in children in a webinar on 14 July.



The IY Basic Parent Group Leaders Training was attended by 12 local and international attendees while the IY Small Dinosaur Group Leaders Training was attended by 12 other attendees.





The Incredible Years® Home Coaching Programme

A group of social workers, youth workers, psychologists, counsellors and student care facilitators from Marymount Centre underwent The Incredible Years Home Coaching programme with us. From the training, they learnt how to coach the clients under their care on behavioural concerns as well as their immediate parents and caregivers.



Nurture 2.0 Programme Volunteers & Lead Teachers Training

For the past 7 years, we had partnered Central Community Development Council (CDC) to train their group of volunteers and Lead Teachers in charge of the Nurture 2.0 child programme. These volunteers and Lead Teachers were trained to manage classroom discipline as well as to enhance engagement in their learners.





Collaboration with Republic Polytechnic



Students from Republic Polytechnic collaborated with Family Wellness Division on their final year project. They helped us to review the promotional processes of our services and programmes. The outcome was a revamped website and a new Telegram channel to reach out to our younger target audience of clientele.

Counselling





The Covid-19 pandemic continued into its third year, wearing down companies and families. Counselling Services saw an increase in the number of cases and provided over 348 counselling therapy hours for clients, a 50% increase from 2021. Morning Star provided not just face-to-face counselling services but also counselling therapy over Zoom for clients who preferred the convenience.

Morning Star continues to provide professional counselling services at the Counselling Centre at Sengkang from Mondays to Fridays and on Saturday mornings. Our team of counsellors and associate counsellors are trained in a variety of therapy modalities, including CBT, Narrative Therapy, EMDR and Play Therapy, and are able to help individuals, couples and families navigate through a wide range of issues.

Morning Star is the first organisation in Singapore to be trained in the LEGO® Brick-by-Brick programme developed by Play Included C.I.C. in the U.K. This programme trains

counsellors and other helping professionals to set up and facilitate Brick Clubs. Brick Clubs involve groups of up to three children interacting with each other through playing with LEGO®. It allows them to hone their skills in communication, respect, friendship-building, problem-solving and other life skills. Counselling Services has set up Brick Clubs in the Student Care Centres at Hougang and St. Gabriel's Primary School. With the expected opening of a new Counselling Centre at Whampoa in 2023, Counselling Services plans to set up a LEGO® room to run Brick Clubs there.


Theraplay® Training for Professionals

After being postponed for two years due to the pandemic, Morning Star successfully organised two runs of Level One Theraplay® Child & Family Training packaged with Group Theraplay® Training and one run of Advanced Theraplay® Practice Training in March 2022. The training was conducted by Mrs Donna Gates, the Senior Supervisor and Trainer for The Theraplay Institute U.S.A. and attracted a total of 18 participants. Morning Star is continuing its partnership with The Theraplay Institute to conduct another round of training in March 2023.

Bedok Green Primary School Community Day

On 23 July 2022, Bedok Green Primary School (BGPS) observed BGPS Community Day to promote mental wellness and environmental education for a stronger Singapore. Morning Star was invited by the school to conduct a 1-hour workshop on 'Mindfulness for Parenting' as part of a repertoire of activities for this event. Participants learned how to use Mindfulness through breathing, body scanning and empathy. Counselling Services looks forward to working with more schools to provide wellness programmes to students, teachers, families and the community.






Brown Bag Webinar
